Course Description:

Level 3 students continue to develop and refine their communication skills. Finer grammatical points and idiomatic expressions of the language are infused into the course of study. Through compositions and readings, students further their understanding of contemporary Hispanic life and culture. An increased emphasis on compositional writing is included. Both teachers and students will be using Spanish to communicate and actively participate in the class. Spanish 3 Honors builds on the program begun in Spanish 1 and 2, adding new vocabulary and more complex grammatical structures while reinforcing what has previously been learned. The primary language of instruction and class activities is Spanish. The expectations and workload in an honors course are high. The curriculum is aligned to the NJSLS for World Language. Activities outlined in the curriculum infuse the Standards for Language Practice. In alignment to the content and practice standards, Spanish 3 students will extend their knowledge of the language and culture as they learn to communicate in different tenses and to describe a variety of vocabulary topics. This accelerated course will require that a significant amount of work be accomplished outside the confines of the class period, and students must have received a 90% or better in their previous coursework at the CP level or an 80% at the honors level to qualify.

Course Competencies/Learning Objectives

Students who successfully complete Spanish 3 Honors will be competent in the following areas:

- Students will be able to communicate using the preterite tense to say what they and others did
- Students will be able to communicate using the imperfect to describe their childhood
- Students will be able to differentiate between the preterite and imperfect tenses
- Students will be able to discuss travels and souvenirs purchased
- Students will be able to tell others what to do using command forms, and create a "how to" recipe presentation

Student Grades

The grading system for this course is based on the category weights listed in each department's policy. For this course, those weights are listed below. Each marking period, students will have a minimum of three (3) Major Assessments and seven (7) Minor Assessments (explained below). Course Participation is assessed twice (2x) per marking period using the district rubric.

Major Assessments	-	55% of marking period grade
Minor Assessments	-	30% of marking period grade
Class Participation	-	15% of marking period grade

Please note: the above areas are used as the basis for 80% of your grade for the course; the midterm and/or final exam will constitute the remaining 20% of your grade.

- Examples of Major Assessments include items that are summative in nature, such as: tests, projects, formal presentations, essays, dialogues, or any other type of assessment used to capture evidence of learning at the culmination of a unit of study.
- Examples of Minor Assessments include items that are formative in nature, such as: quizzes, comprehension checks, informal presentations, informal writing assignments, exit tickets, small-scale research activities, in class worksheets, or any other type of assessment that is diagnostic in nature and used to guide instruction and provide ongoing feedback to students.
- Note: grades for individual assignments are entered into Genesis for the marking period in which the assignment is assigned and collected, and not a subsequent marking period.
- Extra Credit will only be available for assignments that have been approved ahead of time by the teacher and department supervisor.
- In this course, it is expected that students will submit only their best work, and teachers reserve the right not to accept work that is substantially below what a student is capable of producing.
- Please speak to your teacher about the opportunity for earned Second Chances on certain Major Assessments.

HOMEWORK/PROJECTS:

Homework will be assigned on a regular basis and will be graded on completion* as a participation grade using the following guidelines:

- No attempt/not handed in 0%
- Homework attempted but mostly incomplete 50%
- Homework attempted, more than 50% completed 75%
- Homework completed 100%

*There might be times when a larger homework assignment may be collected and graded as a "minor assessment" grade. If this happens to be the case, the students will be told when the homework is assigned that it will be collected for a grade and not just for completion. I WILL NOT accept late homework assignments. You will receive a 0 for any assignment that is not on your desk and ready to be checked the day it is due. If you are absent on the day an assignment is due, the work must be shown to me upon return to receive credit. Failure to do so on the day of return will result in a 0. You will have as many days as you are absent to make up the missed work. It is YOUR responsibility to check the homework board/Google Classroom to find out what work was missed. The work assigned the day you were absent must be shown to me the following class for credit.

All projects are always assigned well in advance so that you have ample time to complete them. Being absent the day a project is due is not an excuse to turn it in late. It is your responsibility to find a way to get it to me. I will deduct 10 points off each day a project is not turned in. Of course, extenuating circumstances arise to which exceptions may be made on an individual basis.
